## Notes to 2017 Navigation Games Financial Statement

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#### **Statement of Activity**

Our main goal for 2017 was to expand our outreach to kids in the Cambridge area and beyond, with a willingness to take a loss to do so. We anticipate that investing in outreach will enable us to charge for our programs and/or get grants to support our work to create a more sustainable future.

Total income was \$26,093, and expenses were \$30,352, for an operating deficit of (\$4,258).

Most of the income was donations: we received a grant of \$1,000 and donations of \$16,697 in cash and \$2,804 in materials and supplies. Most of the expenses were for personnel: \$24,439 paid for employees, and an additional \$485 for professional help and a contractor.

#### Program Revenue and Expenses

Our programs brought in \$5,591 in payments from schools, after-school classes and the Forest-X events. In order to put on the programs, we incurred \$27,286 in expenses. Most of that was personnel (\$22,735 + \$485 = \$23,220). The other program costs were \$3,871 in supplies and \$193 for permits, start fees and insurance.

The in-school programs reach the most children, efficiently.

The summer program looks most expensive, but it also is the way that we reach out to many other youth organizations (all the "Other Youth Orgs"), and develop new curricula and projects - it was the jumping off point for the after-school teams. As a way to fulfill our mission, it is a good investment in both long-term involvement of kids, and breadth of reach. It was also the way that we were able to bring Ethan on board initially.

The public events have the potential to bring in more revenue and are fairly cost-effective to put on. Corporate events could also bring in revenue in the future.

#### Methods for allocating expenses

Payroll costs were allocated across programs based on the fraction of time that staff spent on that program, from our record of programs delivered. For example, 90% of Cristina's time was allocated to the website (Outreach category). 20% of Ethan's time was allocated to the six-week summer program. After determining this allocation for each employee, it was multiplied by their total income to determine the amounts spent per program.

Donated materials and supplies were allocated across programs based on the number of participant-hours, again from our program records, after attributing 5% of the cost to Administration. The fraction of participant-hours for each program type is shown in the Costs per Program table.

#### **Donated Housing**

Not shown in the statement of activity is a contribution of \$10,800 worth of housing in 2017 from Barbara Bryant for employees and volunteers of Navigation Games, based on a cost of \$800 per single room or \$400 per shared room, per month, including utilities and internet, and subsidized meals.

#### Statement of Financial Position

We started with \$7056 in assets (bank, less credit card liability), and ended with \$2,857.

#### **Advancing our Mission**

We provided 462 hours of programming, reached 1488 different kids, with 8,528 participant-hours of orienteering-related activities.

Looking ahead, we would like to get to financial sustainability, and improve the management and operations of the non-profit.

Navigation Games saw a huge spurt of growth for 2017 in the number of programs, schools, and children involved with orienteering. Over the past year, we made nearly 4000 engagements with community members, and over 3500 of those were kids! We also established orienteering as an official sport in three Cambridge upper schools, as well as in the high school. This is doubly exciting because Junior Nationals—the new Interscholastic Championships—will be in Massachusetts for the very first time next spring.

Organizing, setting up, and running orienteering events requires a tremendous amount of time and effort, and with so many programs going on it can be very challenging to keep up. In fact, there was enough demand for our programs in the summer and fall that we would not have been able to run them all without several staff members. Ethan Childs coached, taught, mentored and managed young people learning to orienteer and to teach others. He also designed programs and help with administration. Isak Prellner returned from Sweden over the summer to assist with our youth employment program, and from October through November we had Juanma Merida and Violeta Feliciano from Spain helping to run our numerous school programs.

We've also seen our program begin to spread beyond the boundaries of Cambridge. In past years we have worked with Newton Country Day School, and this fall we also started working with Lincoln-Sudbury Regional High School. Amanda Klein, a physical education teacher from LSRHS, took it upon herself to incorporate orienteering into her Adventure Fitness class after helping with our activity at a Youth Leadership Workshop. We've since worked closely with her to develop lesson plans, and have also functioned as guest teachers on two occasions. Amanda Klein also managed to get us a spot at the Massachusetts Association of Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance (MAHPERD) conference, where we gave a presentation about orienteering and its value in physical education at LSRHS to coaches and physical education teachers from around the state.

To leave off with a few more inspiring statistics: In 2017 we ran orienteering programs at 10 different schools, and four of these schools also established teams. Across all four teams there were nearly 100

student athletes participating—a key factor was partnering our orienteering teams with the school's cross country team. We also taught at nine summer camps with our summer youth employees, and worked alongside NEOC and CSU to start a Youth Orienteering Series (YOS) in Massachusetts. On top of this, we ran after-school classes at three different community schools, each meeting the same group of kids once a week, and many of the kids from out Springtime classes signed up again this fall!
